


- a. Move all present contents to west cabin.
 - b. Use government property poster.
4. When ready, remove contents from green storage shed and dismantled shed.
 5. Concentrate barrels, gas bottles, and other miscellaneous debris for haul out.

We will plan to accomplish most of the above with a Forest Service crew in October, prior to freeze-up. She plans to be gone for a few days about the 14th of the month. The work should be done with her present. Some variations to the above arrangement is acceptable provided that the end result is a reduction in living space that suits her personal needs, plus an emergency overnight lodging. (Regardless of who, she refuses, and I agree, to allow anyone bunk space in her living quarters).

All of the structures are in poor shape and it is possible that within five years she will be shifting either her living quarters and storage facilities or both. By leaving the unused cabin intact, except for furnishings, we can avoid an adverse public reaction to destroying "her" buildings and can also provide her with an alternate living quarters if the need arises due to natural or man caused conditions. (Vandalism, high winds, snow depth, etc.).

She again expressed concern about getting her supplies hauled in this winter. I would recommend that an arrangement similar to last year be made. Also consider that without the additional accommodations, her needs may be reduced. Windstorms in early September blew down several trees on the islands but likely she will need an additional supply of wood.

Dorothy recognizes that at some point her health will force her to leave. She is 69 years old. When that time comes I recommend that all structures except one cabin be dismantled. The doors and windows of the remaining cabin should be removed and the cabin allowed to deteriorate with time.
