

Winter is here to stay

Due to the early on-set of winter temps (even for Ely!) we have been forced to close the Museum to regularly scheduled tour appointments. Those interested in a tour during the winter months are encouraged to call/email with their request. We will do our very best to make ourselves available. However, we do ask folks contact us at least 48-hours in advance but more is preferred.

Although visitation and sales were down 50 and 36 percent respectively this season, we are optimistically planning for next year with fresh ideas for marketing, fundraising and efficiencies in our behind the scenes operations.

The Museum did take advantage of grant opportunities and CARES Act funding available to non-profit businesses such as the Paycheck Protection Program, which provided coverage for a portion of our summer payroll expenses that prevented any furloughs or layoffs of our three Museum staff.

Although not all funding applications were approved, the Museum was able to significantly reduce expenses across the board to help off-set the projected and realized revenue losses.

Unfortunately, this resulted in reduced focus on developing new exhibits and other mission-driven improvements as well as delayed maintenance projects. What could be postponed, was.

We do anticipate current public safety guidance to continue into next season but now that we have our protocols and safety systems in place, we are ready.

Unfortunately, this also means a very conservative approach to our 2021 budget, prolonging the postponement of many of our strategically planned improvements and initiatives.
